new york times bestseller building on the groundwork laid in the new york times bestseller white fragility robin diangelo explores how a culture of niceness inadvertently promotes racism in white fragility robin diangelo explained how racism is a system into which all white people are socialized and challenged the belief that racism is a simple matter of good people versus bad diangelo also made a provocative claim white progressives cause the most daily harm to people of color in nice racism her follow up work she explains how they do so drawing on her background as a sociologist and over 25 years working as an anti racist educator she picks up where white fragility left off and moves the conversation forward writing directly to white people as a white person diangelo identifies many common white racial patterns and breaks down how well intentioned white people unknowingly perpetuate racial harm these patterns include rushing to prove that we are not racist downplaying white advantage romanticizing black indigenous and other peoples of color bipoc pretending white segregation just happens expecting bipoc people to teach us about racism carefulness and feeling immobilized by shame diangelo explains how spiritual white progressives seeking community by co opting indigenous and other groups rituals create separation not

connection she challenges the ideology of individualism and explains why it is ok to generalize about white people and she demonstrates how white people who experience other oppressions still benefit from systemic racism writing candidly about her own missteps and struggles she models a path forward encouraging white readers to continually face their complicity and embrace courage lifelong commitment and accountability nice racism is an essential work for any white person who recognizes the existence of systemic racism and white supremacy and wants to take steps to align their values with their actual practice bipoc readers may also find the insiders perspective useful for navigating whiteness includes a study guide

why and how do those from black and minority ethnic communities continue to be marginalised despite claims that we now live in a post racial society race continues to disadvantage those from black and minority ethnic backgrounds kalwant bhupal explores how neoliberal policy making has increased rather than decreased discrimination faced by those from non white backgrounds she also shows how certain types of whiteness are not privileged gypsies and travellers for example remain marginalised and disadvantaged in society drawing on topical debates and supported by empirical data this important book examines the impact of race on wider issues of inequality and difference in society

contemporary scholars who study race and racism have emphasized that white complicity plays a role in perpetuating systemic racial injustice being white being good seeks to explain what scholars mean by white complicity to explore the ethical and epistemological assumptions that white complicity entails and to offer recommendations for how white complicity can be taught the book highlights how well intentioned white people who might even consider themselves as paragons of antiracism might be unwittingly sustaining an unjust system that they say they want to dismantle what could it mean for white people to be good when they can reproduce and maintain racist system even when and especially when they believe themselves to be good in order to answer this question barbara applebaum advocates a shift in our understanding of the subject of language and of moral responsibility based on these shifts a new notion of moral responsibility is articulated that is not focused on guilt and that can help white students understand and acknowledge their white complicity being white being good introduces an approach to social justice pedagogy called white complicity pedagogy the practical and pedagogical implications of this approach are fleshed out by emphasizing the role of uncertainty vulnerability and vigilance white students who acknowledge their complicity have an increased potential to develop alliance identities and to engage in genuine cross racial dialogue white complicity pedagogy promises to facilitate the type of listening on the part of white students so that they come open and willing to learn and not just to say no applebaum also conjectures that systemically marginalized students would be more likely and willing to invest energy and time and be more willing to engage with the systemically privileged when the latter acknowledge rather than deny their complicity it is a central claim of the book that acknowledging complicity encourages a willingness to listen to rat

describes the decision of several white student teachers to create teaching strategies that eliminate white privilege in schools and analyzes the role of racial identity in the creation and use of teaching practices

understanding whiteness unraveling racism makes whiteness and white privilege visible revealing the cultural and institutional structures that keep white dominance in place the book is both a workbook and reader providing tools for examining what it is to be white in the u s for addressing fear and guilt as barriers to dismantling racism and for identifying the small daily acts and larger organized movements that further the struggle for social justice and equality it includes analytical essays narratives and poems from a variety of diverse perspectives numerous experiential exercises also aid readers in deepening learning through one s own life experiences

presents articles both supporting and opposing issues relating to racism including whether or not it is a serious problem whether or not affirmative action is effective in combating it and how it can be eliminated

primarily discussing black white relations this book provides a useful paradigm for examining and understanding broader issues of prejudice and racism and allows students to understand the factors which lead to these contemporary social problems

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
